Today's festival works as a liturgical bridge between the seasons of Epiphany and Lent. High on a mountain, Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words Jesus heard at his baptism: "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased." For the disciples with Jesus, this time a command is added, "Listen to him!"

Today, we move from the mountain where Jesus offered the sermon, which we call the "Sermon on the Mount," that we've been listening to these past several weeks, to a higher mountain where Jesus is transfigured and on which several of his disciples get a glimpse of Jesus' true glory. Next Sunday, the First Sunday in Lent, we find ourselves down the mountain with Jesus, as he is tempted in the desert.

The omission of singing or saying "alleluia" during Lent goes back at least to the fifth century. The association of alleluia with Easter led to the custom of intentionally omitting alleluias from the liturgy during the season of Lent, a kind of verbal fast which has the effect of creating a sense of anticipation and even greater joy when the familiar word of praise returns. To mark our entry into the Lenten liturgical season, during the singing of the closing hymn, the children will collect the "Alleluia Flags", we have been waving, during the last verse of the Sending Hymn.

Children's Time

First Reading: Exodus 24:12-18

At Mount Sinai, Moses experienced the presence of God for forty days and forty nights. The "glory of the Lord" settled on the mountain, and on the seventh day God called out to Moses. On the mountain, God gave Moses the stone tablets inscribed with the ten commandments.

¹² The Lord said to Moses, "Come up to me on the mountain and wait there; I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction."

¹³ So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up onto the mountain of God. ¹⁴ To the elders he had said, "Wait here for us, until we come back to you. Look, Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them."

¹⁵ Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. ¹⁶ The glory of the Lord settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. ¹⁷ Now the appearance of the glory of the Lord was like a devouring fire on the top of the mountain in the sight of the Israelites. ¹⁸ Moses entered the cloud and went up on the mountain. Moses was on the mountain for forty days and forty nights.

Second Reading: 2 Peter 1:16-21

At the transfiguration, God's voice was heard, declaring Jesus to be the beloved Son. By the activity of the Holy Spirit, God's voice continues to be heard through the word of scripture.

¹⁶ We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. ¹⁷ For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." ¹⁸ We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

¹⁹ So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. ²⁰ First of all, you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, ²¹ because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

The Rev. Kevin T. Shock was elected on November 1, 2025, to a six-year term as the **Bishop of the Allegheny Synod** and was installed last weekend at Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church, Johnstown. “Today”, he writes, “will be my first service and official congregational visit as Bishop!”

Bishop Shock considers himself “A Central Pennsylvania Lutheran, which is reflective of my living within 70 miles of Altoona for my entire life (outside of seminary and one year abroad in college). I’m rooted here!” At November’s Synod Assembly, he spoke about three things he would prioritize to begin his term: “a deep and focused listening to people, a commitment to continue the team-building emphasis that began while Bp. Collins was among us, and leading our people in doing fundamental work in scripture and our Confessions together.”

In listening to leaders across the Synod, he has instituted a team of four pastors to assist him in carrying out the fundamental responsibilities of the office of bishop in the ELCA. Each of his team of four pastors will work one-quarter time to assist his ministry.

The Rev. Deacon Alicia Anderson will serve as **Assistant to the Bishop for Formation**, overseeing our Synod’s candidacy process. She will work with people who are discerning God’s call to public ministry and coordinate educational events for lay people and clergy. She also serves as Campus Minister for Lutheran Campus Ministry at Penn State.

The Rev. Tyler Graham will serve as **Assistant to the Bishop for Transition**, working closely with congregations who are seeking new leaders, clergy who are seeking a new call, and with the Synod Deans to secure pastoral coverage in times of vacancy. He also serves as Pastor of the Living Waters Lutheran Parish.

The Rev. Marty Jo Irvin-Stellabotte will serve as **Assistant to the Bishop for Communications**, generating official Synod communications across all of our media, interpreting ELCA communications for our Synod, and working with congregations as they share their news with our Synod and their local community. She also serves as Pastor of the Geeseytown-Newry Lutheran Parish.

The Rev. Traci Marriott will serve as **Assistant to the Bishop for Life Together**, working with others to match people’s gifts for ministry with the needs of our Synod. She will encourage a healthy philosophy of stewardship for congregations and individuals, and ensure that Synod resources support ministry well. She also serves as Pastor at St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Martinsburg.

Bishop Shock and his spouse, Lisa Bahr, live in Howard with two dogs (more dogs are always pending). Thanks to Lisa, his other passion is animal rescue. He finds renewal in praying, hiking, bicycling, kayaking, and listening to his record collection.
